

### **Options!**


You control your academic destiny!

Bachelor's degrees at universities with 4-5 year programs



- How am I going to fund my studies?




# The Regions of the US

### Do your homework!

High schoolers begin to plan for college during Sophomore and Junior years



- Visit school databases online
- Understand their requirements
- Learn more
- Visit schools, tour campus, shadow a student

Students usually apply to 5-6 schools (a safety, within reach, reach)

# Applications (yes, plural!)



#### Google Knows a Lot

But not everything! Contact the International Students Office of schools you are interested in to talk to real people too.

#### Study and go for it!

Know what tests your schools ask for.

# Show (and tell) them why you're awesome!

# Language Tests: IELTS, TOEFL, TSE, and TWE

#### Know your schools!



#### **TOEFL**

Widely accepted in the US. Minimum score requirements vary by school.

#### TSE/TWE

Frequently not required but recommended.

#### **IELTS**

Becoming more accepted, check with your school. Minimum score requirements vary by school.

#### **Dates/Locations**

Check test providers' websites, know your deadlines and don't be afraid to travel.



# **Essays/Letters of Recommendation**

Make every word count!

#### Tailor your essay!

It's okay to have a template essay and add or subtract to it for different schools. Different places look for different information.


#### Letters of Recommendation

Ask someone who knows you well. Ask in advance. Give suggestions, accept the end result.





#### Practical Considerations/Things to Research





- The US is bigger than it appears on a map.

- Deadlines, Start-End dates
- Housing: On or off campus?
- Cost of living in the US is NOT cheap!

# **Put Your Application Together**

Starting from high school, students must plan their college process

- SAT/ACT
- GPA: Grade Point Average
- Common Application
  - Essays
- Payment (parents, grants, scholarships)
  - FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)


