COURSE ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

The prerequisite for passing the seminar after each semester of implementation is attendance at 90% of all classes and knowledge of the assigned literature.

Possible semester grades are: 2.0, 3.0, 3.5, 4.0, 4.5, 5.0.

The sufficient condition for obtaining a grade in the seminar is:

grade 2 - the doctoral student has no knowledge of the topics discussed,

grade 3 - the doctoral student knows the texts discussed, but is unable to use them in the discussion.

grade 3.5 - the doctoral student knows the discussed texts, but is able to use them in the discussion to a limited extent.

evaluation 4 - doctoral student knows the texts under discussion, is able to identify arguments, but is unable to independently formulate a hypothetical solution to the problem under discussion. evaluation 4.5 - the doctoral student knows the discussed texts, is able to identify arguments, independently formulates hypothetical solutions to the discussed problem, and his work on the dissertation proceeds in a planned manner.

evaluation 5 - the doctoral student knows the texts discussed, is able to identify arguments, independently formulates hypothetical solutions to the problem discussed, and his work on the dissertation is far advanced.
