### BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

(100-200 words)

The subject takes up the problem of cultural identity from the methodological side. Preliminarily, closely related terms such as identification, belonging and sense of identity will be considered. Each of them entails different ontological commitments, as it moves the problem from a noun perspective to a verb perspective. In it, recognition, resentment, "significant Others" and the network of intersecting collective affiliations will be key. The conditions of cultural identity will also be an important issue, and here the patterns of culture both high and popular.
